			<p>I can use the explanation that light travels in straight lines to explain that objects are seen because they give out or reflect light into the eye.</p> <p>I can demonstrate and explain that we see things because light travels from light sources to our eyes or from light sources to objects and then to our eyes.</p> <p>I can demonstrate that light travels in straight lines to show why shadows have the same shape as the objects that cast them.</p> <p><b><u>Living things and their Habitats</u></b></p> <p>I can give reasons for classifying plants and animals based on specific characteristics.</p> <p>I can describe how plants, animals and micro-organisms are classified into broad groups according to common observable characteristics and based on similarities and differences.</p>
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
